And, he has shown me yet again that in times of both blessings and woes, God loves us and never leaves us because we are all his children. It has been an honour to serve you as your curate. 



# REV. AARON'S THOUGHTS ON A WONDERFUL TRIP

Getting to Zambia from Dublin should have been easy. Dublin to Madrid to pick up more passengers, Madrid to Addis Ababa to take a flight to Ndola. Easy! HA! Dublin to Madrid then Barcelona because of bad weather in Madrid. Then back to Madrid and on to Addis. We missed our flight, stayed a few hours in a hotel in Addis then took a flight to Johannesburg to get a flight to Ndola. Two days! Phew!

Once In Kitwe in the university campus we rested and got used to our surroundings. Keith and Lyn Scott, our hosts, looked after us and Lyn cooked us dinner most nights. The itinerary included some of the following: going to a rural community called Mutenda to see a community being trained to teach Early Childhood Development classes in local communities. We met a church community in Buchi who showed us the building projects that will generate more income for the church and try to raise the standard of housing. And we met ordinands in the seminary who upon completion of their course will become church leaders in very needy areas.

What was impressed upon me was that these people are making the most of what little they have and are not griping about what they don't have. And what they do have isn't a lot. We visited a well-constructed school where each child was treated with the optimistic expectation that they would all accomplish greatness. They had very little and what they did have they cherished. By comparison we visited a very poor village, Hippopo, where the children and adults had very little and next to no prospects, and lived only a couple of miles up river from a dumping ground for sulphuric acid from the copper mines, yet when they met us they sang to God giving thanks for the gift of song.

Primarily, Noreen Hurst (MU), Rev Hazel Minion, Bishop Trevor Williams and myself went to see what Keith and Lyn are doing in the seminary. And I can tell you, their work is exemplary. They still need our financial support so keep the Smartie tubes coming in. But the gift of going to see them, to support their projects in person is worth more in some ways than the finance. Please continue to pray and financially support this very worthwhile cause.



# NOREEN'S THOUGHTS ON A WONDERFUL TRIP

As Aaron has outlined, our journey to Kitwe was more adventurous and tiring than we had planned. I was so exhausted when we arrived, I would have slept anywhere.

On the first morning we met the students in St John's seminary and in the afternoon visited St. James parish Buchi where we were shown houses that were being built to let to help finance the completion of the church hall. Our visit finished with a short service that included the MU choir, St Veronica's and the youth choir, with drums and key boards. This first visit and introduction to life in a Zambian parish was very humbling. We were treated with such respect, kindness, hugs, genuine appreciation for travelling all the way from Ireland to meet them and share stories.

This was to be the norm everywhere we went. The hospitality continued and Rev Hazel and I were invited to the Rev Stephen's house for a meal of fish, vegetables and nshima which was prepared by his wife. Our hands were washed by his daughters, before and after the meal. We felt so humbled by the respect shown and the welcome we received everywhere we went, from all walks of life, from the poorest villages and families that we met to the more wealthy families.

Each day we visited a different part of Zambia. We travelled as far north as possible to the border with the DR Congo and witnessed the devastation happening to the country side and the water supply as a result of the impact of the copper mines. Travelling is difficult as the roads often have very rough surfaces with many huge pot holes. Everywhere you journey, there are so many people on the side of the road hoping to be picked up for work. Women walking for miles carrying babies on their back to get water or reach a roadside hut selling fruit or veg.

Alongside these difficulties, there are many positives. We learned about the work of churches and in particular the Mutenda Rural Health Centre. We met Chisemba and Father Sam, a Kenyan priest, doing development work. Chiemba was leading a 3 day training course for workers, attended by lots of enthusiastic men and women keen to learn. Father Douglas showed us the church built from bricks made from termite mounds and the borehole dug in 2017. They are also planning to build another church, further back into the bush where the more isolated families live.

There are many challenges and problems for the people who live in this tough environment, both rural and urban which they are tackling where possible. I saw the positives and the negatives, the problems and the successes. Most importantly, I met the people, listened, shared stories and mutual respect. This trip to Zambia, for me, was a dream come true. I felt both privileged and humbled to have spent two weeks in this beautiful country, meeting with Mothers' Union members, families, clergy and students.

# CHURCH AND PARISH CENTRE IMPROVEMENTS

We recently hosted a funeral for a family from another parish and it was wonderful to hear such positive comments about how beautiful our church and hall complex is. Often we take it for granted and fail to observe what wonderful facilities we have in All Saints'. Thankfully we are in a financial position to ensure that we keep all our buildings in the best possible order, but there are always new jobs to take care of as well as updating and refurbishing older items.

**Over the past few months we have spent approximately** £30,000 in improvements which include the repainting of the parish centre. It looks really fresh. The gents and ladies toilets have had new toilets fitted, the floors and walls have been retiled, new wash hand basins fitted and the unsightly pipework hidden behind panels. If you need to spend a penny, we have the best WCs in the town.


Our sound system has really outlived its usefulness – as someone remarked, we are broadcasting in Black &White when there is full High Definition available. Hopefully by the time you are reading this article, we will have new radio mics for the clergy, mics for the pulpit and lectern (reading desk) and mics for the choir. This will greatly enhance our worship and will hopefully avoid situations where those at home watching on the live streaming will have no sound. Our online streaming has been greatly enhanced by the acquisition of a new HD camera and the picture quality is amazing. Along with this, we have installed a drop-down screen which is housed high above the floor and can by remote controlled to come down at the appropriate time to allow the showing of video clips, prayers and information videos without the need for a wobbly data projector, wonky screen and many loose cables. In memory of Canon Forsythe, we are in the process of lighting up the east window which will also enhance the worship experience on dark winters evenings.

Thanks to our parishioner Graham Brown and MCN Media for all their hard work and diligence in installing the audio visual improvements over these past weeks.

- Will **NEVER** threaten arrest if payment isn't made immediately.
- Will **NEVER** ask for money for a 'free gift', 'admin fee' or as part of a promotion.
- Will **NEVER** ask to reveal your account security codes or online passwords in full.
- Will **NEVER** call out of the blue and ask for remote access to your computer or devices or to download software.
- Will **NEVER** inform you about tax returns by email, text or voicemail.

# SAFEGUARDING TRUST

The Church of Ireland safeguarding policy and procedure applies to all clergy, staff and volunteers but especially those who have regular contact with children or adults who may be more at risk of harm or abuse because of their personal or life circumstances.

If you have any concerns regarding issue of child protection of safety, the parish panel members are:

If you are worried about the safety or welfare of a child, it is important that you report it. Even if you're not sure, it's always best to tell professionals about your concerns. Social services and the police can investigate concerns about a child's safety and can be contacted on the **Northern HSC Trust's 03001234333** 

# What is **Safeguarding trust**?

# Safeguarding Trust is the Church of Ireland Child Safeguarding Policy.

The policy complies with the Children First Act 2015, Children First: National Guidance for the Protection and Welfare of Children (2017) and Child Safeguarding: A Guide for Policy, Procedure and Practice (2018).

# Why is a child safeguarding policy needed?

The welfare of children is of paramount importance and the policy gives clear direction to all those who work with children in the Church of Ireland.

Parents have a right to expect these standards as they entrust their children to the Church.

# Who has responsibility for **Safeguarding Trust** in the parish?

The **parish panel** has responsibility for overseeing the implementation of **Safeguarding Trust**. A Panel is normally made up of the rector and two or more lay people, one of whom must not be directly involved in youth or children's ministry in their own parish.

### How are staff and volunteers recruited?

There is a recruitment process for staff and volunteers, which includes an application process, interview, taking up references and Access NI vetting.

**Safeguarding Trust** training is provided for everyone who works with children.

Workers sign a Declaration of acceptance of **Safeguarding Trust**.

# What information will I need to provide when my child joins a parish club/ organisation or attends a diocesan event?

You will be required to complete the following:

- A membership registration form for your child giving contact details, relevant medical conditions and any special requirements.
- Consent forms for specific activities, outings or residentials.
- Consent to allow your child to be photographed and/or to allow clergy, staff and volunteers to contact your child via social/digital media, where this is applicable.

# Confidentiality

Information in relation to you or your children will only be shared with people who 'need to know' and our practice is that this would be done with your prior knowledge in line with Children First. Records will be kept in compliance with the General Data Protection Regulation.

# What happens if there is a safeguarding concern?

If a panel has reasonable grounds for concern they will make a report to a Duty Social Worker in Gateway, or in an emergency, the PSNI.

If you have a concern about a child, you can talk to a panel member or you can contact a Duty Social Worker in Gateway directly. Details of your parish panel should be displayed in all parish premises.

# IN SPITE OF THE CIRCUMSTANCES, **GOD IS WITH YOU**

Several times in one chapter, Genesis 39, the Bible tells us that the Lord was with Joseph. But that didn't exempt him from jealousy and betrayal, or the advances of Potiphar's wife, or her lies that sent him to prison. The Bible says, 'They bruised his feet with fetters and placed his neck in an iron collar. Until the time came to fulfil his dreams, the Lord tested Joseph's character' (Psalm 105:18-19 NLT). Joseph didn't know it, but he was in training for reigning. God wanted to see if he would choose trust over lust, and obedience over expedience.

It's in looking back that you realise why one of God's names is 'Redeemer'. He can redeem everything you've been through – the good, the bad, and the ugly. The lesson Joseph learned is this: God is with you even when there is no evidence He is. He is walking alongside you. He is working with you. He is going ahead of you to rearrange circumstances in your favour. His Word says, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." So that we may boldly say: "The Lord is my helper; I will not fear. What can man do to me?" (Hebrews 13:5-6 NKJV). But sometimes in the plan of God things get worse before they get better. That's when you must tighten your grip and lean harder on God: 'Therefore do not cast away your confidence, which has great reward. For you have need of endurance, so that after you have done the will of God, you may receive the promise' (Hebrews 10:35-36 NKJV).
