### **BE MORE LIKE** A ROMAN SOLDIER

St Paul, in his well-known passage in Ephesians 6 uses the image of a Roman soldier kitted out for battle as an example of how we should be ready for action as followers of Jesus. The Roman army had conquered the known civilised world around the time of Jesus and soldiers would have been seen in every town and city in the empire.

They were fearsome warriors who knew how to attack and defend in the time of war. Soldiers do a great deal of training to be ready for the heat of battle carrying out lots of drills and manoeuvres to ensure that when they need to, they know exactly what to do to fight for one another and to avoid getting killed.

Christians, St Paul encourages us to be like a soldier, but instead of being adept with the use of a sword or a bow and arrow, our spiritual soldiering skills which give us strength and the means of defence in a time of attack are developed through a knowledge of the scriptures, regular times of worship together and individual times of prayer.

Roman soldiers made a clever use of their shields to protect them from the arrows and spears of their enemies. We get our strength as members of All Saints from the times when we meet together to worship God our Father and to catch up with our friends.


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#### DATES FOR STARTING BACK

Although my previous experience of a youth organisation had been in the Boys' Brigade, I was aware of the importance belonging to such an organisation was in the formation of a young person's life, helping them to develop a whole range of life skills.

Our Scout Group has come such a long way from our initial promising beginnings in September 2011 where on the first night we had nine boys and three leaders and by the end of the session in June 2012, we had over 25 Beavers, Cubs and Scouts and 10 leaders. Since then we have grown and grown and on most Tuesday

#### MAKE CRITICISM WORK FOR YOU

'Whoever loves instruction loves knowledge, but he who hates correction is stupid.'

Proverbs 12:1 NKJV

There are two kinds of criticism:

- 1. **Unfair criticism**. There'll always be people who love to rain on your parade; people who try to build themselves up by tearing others down. Mark Twain said, 'Keep away from people who try to belittle your ambitions. Small people always do that, but the really great make you feel that you, too, can become great.'
- 2. **Constructive criticism**. Solomon said, 'Like an earring of gold or an ornament of fine gold is the rebuke of a wise judge to a listening ear' (*Proverbs 25:12 NIV*). There's a major obstacle you must overcome in order to reach your highest potential. What is it? Our natural reluctance to discover anything unflattering about ourselves. When you erect defences against your inadequacies and try to hide your faults, you close the door to a vital source of self-knowledge. And in so doing, you deny yourself the joy of growing.

Every one of us can improve what we're doing or the way we're doing it. In fact, if you're still celebrating what you did last year – you're not making enough progress this year. After winning his third world championship, instead of having a big celebration, bull rider Tuff Hedeman moved on to Denver to start a new season – the whole process over again. His line of reasoning was: 'The bull in Denver won't be impressed with what I did last week.' Whether you're an untested rookie or a veteran, if you want to be a champion tomorrow, you must be teachable today. Or as Solomon puts it: 'Whoever learns from correction is wise' (*Proverbs 15:5 NLT*).
