GOOD FRIDAY WALK OF WITNESS

We are delighted to be able to report that we will be having our sixteenth Walk of Witness. In the past, in each church, the clergy lead a short service of a scripture reading based on Christ's crucifixion, a hymn and a prayer. However, with Covid restrictions, we are not going to go into each church, rather the people are encouraged to meet at High Street at 11.30am and we are bussed to Antrim Methodist Church where the first outdoor service



begins at 12.00 noon. We will walk down the Greystone Road into the town, past All Saints and St Comgall's, hopefully to gather under the bandstand in the Parterre Gardens in the Castle grounds at 12.45pm for a short act of worship and return to High Street Presbyterian Church to collect our cars. We hope to see you join us in this very powerful affirmation of our unity in the Christian faith.

EASTER MORNING DAWN SERVICE

We are having our Dawn Service at 7.30am the Lough Shore Car Park on Easter Sunday 17 April to celebrate our Lord's resurrection. We are delighted to report that to date, we have raised over £1,000 and this has been passed on to Women's Aid who will ensure that the most needy in our community will receive a voucher to bring a little relief to heat their homes. Arlene Creighton from Women's Aid was delighted to receive a cheque for £1,000. In an email to Irene Gates, who is co-ordinating our appeal, Arlene wrote, 'This is brilliant, thank you so much to everyone for their generous support. With the rising costs putting extra demands on our fuel monies this will be very much appreciated.' We have a set a target of £2,000 for our this project.





REPAIRS TO OUR CHURCH TOWER

All our church buildings are inspected by a qualified architect/surveyor every five years to ensure that the fabric of our buildings is kept in the best state of repair and to ensure our safety. Following our recent quinquennial inspection report, in which certain problems with the tower were highlighted, we commissioned Chris McCollum to carry out a drone survey of the church tower and a more detailed report on what actions were needed to be taken to prevent further deterioration. This was done in November 2021 and the Select Vestry received the written and photographic reports at the beginning of February 2022.

Immediate work required £30,000: this includes the costs of replacing all rainwater goods including down pipes and gutters. There is evidence of the failure of our guttering, downpipes and joints and this has resulted in water getting into the stonework of the building. As the stone is not being allowed to dry properly, vegetation is growing and some stonework joints are failing. If this is not dealt with, there could be a more rapid deterioration of the stones in the tower and this could also lead to problems with timbers rotting. There is strong evidence that we are experiencing more regular and more powerful bouts of rainfall than in previous years, and our current guttering cannot deal with the greater volumes of water.

Necessary work - repairing stone to the tower £86,000: some of the stonework on the elevation of the tower at the front door, the north side, is showing signs of deterioration as is the stonework on the opposite elevation, the south side which is subjected to more weathering due to the prevailing winds.

Desirable work - further long term repairs £75,000: a building as old as All Saints, dating back to 1596 for the main church building and 1816 for the tower needs constant attention. The survey shows where stones have been replaced over the years and this survey highlights the need to keep a constant watch on how our stones are weathering. Our tower and spire are generally in a good state of repair and this desirable work may not be needed to be addressed for quite a while, but in the interim period we have been advised to keep a regular check on the overall integrity of the stonework of all the church.

At the Select Vestry meeting on Monday 28 March, we had a very useful meeting with Chris McCollum and we have decided to carry out the immediate work (£30,000) of replacing the rainwater goods and the work to the north (front door) elevation (£43,000). When fees are added, we are probably looking at costs of close to £80,000.

How are we going to raise £80,000?

We hope to raise this sum over a period of five years, partly through grants which we will apply for from the National Churches Trust, the Heritage Lottery Fund and the Church of Ireland Fabric Fund. Realistically, we will probably have to fund about £60,000 ourselves. This is a large amount of money, but when broken down, it equates to each person or family that has a set of Freewill Offering Envelopes giving an extra £3.50 per month in our blue monthly Fabric Fund Envelope. Hopefully this is a challenge we can all meet to ensure the future of our beautiful historic church building.

THE CROSS

The cross is a universal symbol of Christianity; it's almost impossible to go anywhere without seeing it on a steeple or headstone.
