# **THE WONDER OF HIS LOVE**

I enjoy watching some of the made for television Christmas movies which appear on a certain channel every afternoon from November. The great American architect Frank Lloyd Wright of the mid-twentieth century once cynically described television as 'chewing gum for the eyes' and these formulaic movies fall into that category. They are easy to watch and are based on the theme boy meets girl or girl meets boy. They eventually begin to notice each other, there is the possibility of romance and then with 20 minutes to go before the end of the movie, the potential wedding bells are silenced only for the romance to be salvaged. Boy then kisses girl and everyone lives happily ever after.

The films usually begin with an ariel shot of an idyllic midwest American town lightly dusted with snow. Everyone is dressed in red or green or red and green tartan and everyone is busily working to have the best Christmas ever. Sometimes the film may even be centered around a church BUT, Jesus is never mentioned. Yes there may be an occasional carol in the background, however the central message, the reason for the season, is sadly absent. Huge efforts are made to have the best mince pies, or Christmas jumper, or best decorated tree but no mention of Jesus. It is a bit like having all the trappings - sprouts, stuffing, crackers and cranberry sauce, but no turkey.

We cannot overstate the ordinariness of the first Christmas and those who gathered around the manger in Bethlehem. Mary was no-one special. She was a young ordinary girl from a poor family who was engaged or betrothed to a carpenter BUT when she was visited by the angel Gabriel with the message, 'Greetings, you who are highly favoured! The Lord is with you,' although she was greatly troubled, she said yes. 'I am the Lord's servant. May your word to me be fulfilled.' The ordinariness of the first Christmas is further emphasised in that Mary's home town Nazareth is never mentioned in the Hebrew scriptures before we learn of Mary. The shepherds who were encouraged by the angels to leave their flocks on a hillside and 'go and see this thing that has come to pass,' were of such lowly status in the religious world. Yet they said yes and were the first to witness the miracle of the Messiah's birth. God our Father wants us, his ordinary children to know more of his love.

The story is told that when Queen Victoria first experienced electric light, she was so amazed that she had a servant to stand by the switch turning it on and off to demonstrate the new reality of instant illumination. Where there was darkness, now there was light. This is what happened on the first Christmas. The true light that gives light to everyone came into the world. Sadly, he came to his own people, but they did not receive him. Thankfully the gift of Jesus and the life he gives was opened to all the world not just the children of Israel. The light of his love still shines into the dark places of our lives.

This Christmas, may we discover once more, the power of that light and that love. May we not get so anxious about presents and festive food and find room in our heart to come and worship him and discover the wonder of his love.




## SMARTIE TUBE APPEAL

# **CHURCH TOWER UPDATE**

The necessity of having to carry out repairs to the belltower and spire was first brought to our attention when we received our Quinquennial report in 2021. Every church in the Church of Ireland has an inspection every five years and this helps ensure that we keep our buildings in as good a condition as possible. All Saints' Church is in a good state of repair, but due to the size and height of the tower and spire, the cost of replacing some defective stones, repointing the stones and replacing rainwater goods that are past their sell by date soon adds up, especially when you factor in the need for scaffolding. We estimate that the costs of the project will be in and around £290,000 and when other projects are included, **the total will possibly exceed £320,000**.

The process to secure funding for such a sizeable project was lengthy. Initially we made an application to the National Churches Trust and were delighted to secure a **Wolfsen Grant of £10,000**. We were also selected as one of a small number of churches throughout the British Isles that were beneficiaries of the **National Churches Trust Last Chance Churches grant scheme** and we received a further **£34,985**.

Our major application was to the National Lottery Heritage Fund. In the application process we had to demonstrate the heritage of our church building and how it is cherished not only by ourselves, but by a great many groups within the town and beyond who also cherish our building which is one of the town's most significant architectural landmarks.

Thanks to securing a massive grant of **£172,708** from the **National Lottery Heritage Fund**, we have been able to commission two videos. One will promote All Saints as part of the town's architectural heritage and the other will be an information video for visitors to the church giving them some in-depth explanations of the history behind the church, its windows, communion silver and funeral monuments. Along with this we are developing a new visitors' guide and updating our 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary history book. The restoration project also had to show that we were conscious of offsetting the impact of our repairs by giving consideration to several projects that would benefit the environment. In 2025 we will be planting trees, helping clean up the Six Mile River bank and wilding a part of the graveyard.

The **£51,237.70** raised through our Parish Gift Day was simply magnificent. It demonstrates how we cherish our beautiful church building which in turn is the place where we learn week by week of God's love for each of us.

We are now in the process of tendering for an architect to oversee the restoration work, then tendering for a suitably qualified contractor and appointing a project officer who will liaise with all the agencies involved. We now hope to see scaffolding on site before Easter 2025!

## THE POWER OF SPEAKING THE RIGHT WORDS

We live in unprecedented times. The airwaves are filled with words, as is the Internet. Thanks to social media, anyone with the capacity for talking can post any information, ideas and opinions they choose to present. Because TV news is now 24/7, there is no end to commentary and expositions on the day's news and events. The round-the-clock hours must be filled with sound, not silence. As a result, we could say that never in the history of humankind has so much been said by so many - about so little.

One consequence of this is that people so eager to speak often fail to pause and consider what they are

speaking. Positive or negative, gentle or harsh, they open their mouths and let the words fly out. It reminds me of Proverbs 10:19 which warns, "When there are many words, wrongdoing is unavoidable. But he who restrains his lips is wise."

But even if we choose not to get caught up in the communications chaos of social media and limit our exposure to the rantings that are so common in the mass media, we still are not immune to the power of words for good or for ill. We can be the perpetrators or victims (or both) of words carelessly used.

Email is a wonderful and rapid way of communicating. But if we do not exercise caution by first reviewing and reconsidering what we have written before hitting "Send," we might regret it later. Especially if what we write is in a moment of anger or high emotion. The same can be true when leaving voicemail messages or texts on our smartphones. What sounded good and fitting at first may cause considerable distress later.

With effective communicating so essential for the 21st century business and professional world, but at the

same time so challenging, here are some principles from the Bible that can be helpful to us:

**Choose our words wisely.** I have known people who were more than eager to give others a piece of their mind that they could not afford to lose. Considering in advance the impact of the words we intend to say can determine whether they will be beneficial or destructive. "A word aptly spoken is like apples of gold in settings of silver. Like an earring of gold or an ornament of fine gold is a wise man's rebuke to a listening ear" (Proverbs 25:11-12).

Consider our words as tools for building up, not tearing down. In our world we can find so much negativity, often involving words spoken and written with bad intentions. It is not necessary for us to contribute to that. By using words that lift up rather than tear down, we can make a significant difference. "Let no unwholesome word proceed from your mouth, but only such a word as is good for edification according to the need of the moment, so that it will give grace to those who hear" (Ephesians 4:29).

**Counter words that are hurtful.** Have you ever watched someone after he or she has been the target of angry or vindictive words? Perhaps you have been one of them at times yourself. Knowing the pain and discomfort that hurtful words can cause, we should strive instead to offer words that heal, encourage and inspire. "Reckless words pierce like a sword, but the tongue of the wise brings healing" (Proverbs 12:18). Do not be part of the communications disease. Rather, strive to be part of the cure.

2. It is said to be unlucky to eat a mince pie with a knife. Luckily, we


use our fingers and thumbs rather than a knife and fork!

4. Candy canes were invented to keep kids quiet in church. In 1670,

a German choirmaster (a person who leads a choir) asked a sweet shop to make sweets (in the shape of a shepherd's hook) for the children at his church to keep them quiet during the Christmas festivities.

5. Instead of turkey at Christmas, it used to be a pigs head and mustard. Imagine sitting down for your Christmas dinner and seeing a pig's head in the middle of the table. Turkey didn't appear on the Christmas menu until Henry VIII in the 1500s.
